Topics of human dignity and developmental knowledge have been woven into the workshops and will continue to be the focus of the analysis in regards to creating safety interventions that promote dignity and well-being after violence. Dignity is advanced through the preventative nature of the work, in creating communities where violence will not be tolerated and where police and social responses to violence will be quick and effective.

Methods of honoring resistance, through means such as interviewing, therapeutic conversation, reports and in daily conversation have been explored throughout the training. The fact that people resist violence and mistreatment is a key component of the response-based framework and is embedded in each of the workshops.

"Safety can be found in culture and culture in safety." When we are free to live in accordance with our cultural ways, we will be safe. When living by our cultural code of Dena Au'Nazen, no one would be hurt and justice would be built in to our lives.






GUN CASE MAKING WORKSHOP
